## New Faculty and Staff



Dr. Jamie Desjardins joins the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders as an Associate Teaching Professor and Director of Undergraduate Programs. She will coordinate the 4+1 program and teach undergraduate CSD courses and graduates courses in Audiology. She has experience teaching and developing more than 12 different CSD courses. Dr. Desjardins earned her Ph.D. in Audiology from SU in 2011 and was awarded the Doctoral Prize for

Outstanding Doctoral Dissertation in the College of Arts & Sciences. She stayed at SU to complete a Post-Doctoral Fellowship through the Center for Aging and Policy Study.

Prior to returning to SU, Dr. Desjardins was an Assistant Professor at the University of Texas at El Paso from 2014 - 2019. The focus of Dr. Desjardins' research is on the aging auditory system, listening effort in bilingual older adults, and hearing aid use among older adults. Her research has been supported by grants from NIH, the American Academy of Audiology, and the American Speech-Language-Hearing Foundation.

Dr. Desjardins is a certified audiologist and licensed to practice in both Texas and New York.



Dr. Stephanie McMillen joins the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders as an Assistant Professor. Dr. McMillen received her PhD in Communication Sciences and Disorders from The University of Memphis in 2017. She completed a Post-doctoral Fellow at The University of Texas at Austin from 2017 - 2019 and was a Visiting Research Scholar at Temple University from 2018 - 2019. She will be teaching courses in language development and language disorders in children.

Dr. McMillen's research focus is on the longitudinal trajectories of spoken and written language for bilingual children with and without language impairment. Her work incorporates behavioral measures and online processing, including eye-tracking to evaluate developmental trends of lexical-semantic growth in culturally and linguistically diverse populations.

Dr. McMillen is a certified Speech-Language Pathologist who has worked with children with a range of speech and language impairments. She is a member of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association and the Society for the Scientific Study of Reading.



Ms. Laura Vincent joins the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders as an Assistant Teaching Professor. Her primary responsibilities will be to provide clinical teaching in the Gebbie Speech-Language-Hearing Clinic to both undergraduate and graduate students. She received her Master's degree in speech-language pathology from the College of Saint Rose in 2012. Prior to Syracuse University,

Laura was a speech pathologist in the

Skaneateles School District from 2014 - 2019 and chaired the Committee on Special Education for students in kindergarten through 12th grade.

Laura has extensive experience working with children on the autism spectrum. She received specialized training from NYU as part of the Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) Nest Support Project, which was created to advance the development and implementation of educational solutions for children living with an ASD. #### Retirement



Professor Kim Lamparelli Professor Kim Lamparelli will retire in January 2020 after providing 6 years of outstanding service to the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders as both a faculty member and clinic director. As director of the Gebbie Speech-Language Clinic, Professor Lamparelli implemented new services in the clinic, expanded externship sites both within and outside of the Syracuse area, and has been an exceptional mentor and teacher to students in the speechlanguage pathology program and undergraduate program. She received the College of Arts and Sciences Excellence in Master Level Teaching Award at SU. Prior to coming to SU, Professor Lamparelli was the clinic director at College of Saint Rose for 17 years. She was awarded the Recognition for Service Excellence by The College of Saint Rose in 2005.

Professor Lamparelli has distinguished herself in service throughout her career. She was the President and Vice President of the Capital Area Speech-Language-Hearing Association, sat on numerous American Speech-Language-Hearing Association committees, and was the regional President of the New York Board of Regional Presidents. Professor Lamparelli received Distinguished Service Awards from the New York State Speech-Language-Hearing Association and the Capital Area Speech-Language-Hearing Association. For over 20 years, Professor Lamparelli has been an active member (coach, judge, assistant state director) of Odyssey of the Mind.

### New 4+1 Program

We are pleased to announce that in August we had our first student, Eve Mercer, graduate from the new 4 + 1 program. This is a four-year B.S. in CSD and one-year M.S. in speechlanguage pathology. Undergraduate students in their junior year can apply for this program and, if admitted, they will start taking graduate courses in their senior year. We are one of a small number of universities around the country that offers this unique opportunity to students. This is a highly selective

program and we hope it helps us keep our top undergraduate students at SU for graduate school. Currently, we have two students who recently started the program this fall, and we anticipate a full cohort to begin the program in the fall of 2020.



## Research Highlights

### **Grants Concluded**

Project Meaningful Differences, US Department of Education Grant, Graduates 18 Scholars

In December, 2018, a grant from Office of Special Education Programs, concluded with the graduation of the last of 18 scholars (five cohorts) funded by the grant. The grant was awarded to Dr. Linda Milosky, Dr. Tanya Eckert, (Psychology) and then clinic director, **Dr. Janet Ford**. The scholars were master's students in speech pathology

With funding from the grant, supplemented

who were trained in language, learning, and academically-oriented behaviors for children from backgrounds of poverty or in high-needs school districts. Training also included data-collection methods. Clinical faculty and externship supervisors worked with the scholars and grant personnel to implement single-case designs, a gold standard for measuring individual treatment effects, for pre-school and early school-aged clients.

> by the Kurman Travel Fund, each of the scholars presented at least one single-case design at the ASHA or NYSSLHA convention. Scholars reported that learning how to construct and carry out single-case designs helped them better understand and

critically evaluate single-case designs in professional literature/presentations. In a recent final evaluation survey one scholar noted "Presenting my poster was one of the most rewarding and inspiring experiences I have had in this field."

Scholars have been working in public schools, and publicly funded EI, preschool or specialized schools, and 11 of the 18 scholars have worked in settings in which at least 75% of the children they see come from low-income homes or have attended high-needs school districts. Scholars valued the exposure to special considerations needed in working with low income families. "For example, I'm more aware of automatic assumptions that I might make about clients and families that I interact with, and I actively challenge my assumptions so that I can better serve my clients and meet them where they are at. In my interactions with colleagues, I'm more inclined to bring up perspectives gained from the PMD seminar

into our discussions about challenges with parents and students. I believe it has helped me to better understand and empathize with the struggles impoverished and disadvantaged parents encounter and how that impacts parenting choices. Understanding the factors that may affect their choices helps me to serve them without judgement or frustration."

We are very grateful to have been able to support our scholars in their learning about poverty and assessment of treatment efficacy, as well as having had the opportunity to learn so much from and alongside them.

### **Grants Awarded**



**Dr. Jonathan Preston's** Speech Production lab has two ongoing clinical trials. One randomized controlled trial for school-age children ages 9 - 17 years with childhood apraxia of speech (CAS) is in its third year. This study compares treatment outcomes for children with CAS who are treated with and without ultrasound visual feedback of the tongue during speech. Differences in treatment schedule models are also being studied (intensive vs. distributed treatment).

Additionally, in a newly funded NIH grant, Dr. Preston's lab is one of three sites involved in a multi-site randomized controlled trial to study the

effects of ultrasound visual feedback, visual acoustic feedback, and traditional articulation therapy for school-age children with residual /r/ distortions. This five-year, \$3.7 million project will study treatment outcomes from over 110 children with persisting /r/ errors to determine the degree to which biofeedback affects treatment outcomes. Several SLPs and graduate students are involved in this project.

### Student Research

Michaela Baratta is working in Dr. Victoria Tumanova's Stuttering Research Lab. She is currently conducting research on temperament and childhood stuttering. Michaela is collecting ECG data to determine a child's temperament, and examining the relationship between temperament and fluency in children.

Nina Benway is working in Dr. | onathan Preston's Speech Production Lab. Nina is currently involved in data collection for the single-case experimental design arm of a multi-center study investigating responses to different types of biofeedback-enhanced treatments for children and adolescents with speech errors on /r/ (NIH-R01DC017476, T. McAllister, PI). Nina has also investigated how perceptual speech features can be used to distinguish between children who have received diagnoses of childhood apraxia of speech and children with other subtypes of speech sound disorder. She has presented aspects of this project at the 2019 International Child Phonology Conference in Montreal, Quebec, Canada, and will be presenting at ASHA 2019 in Orlando, Florida with SLP master's student Raya Campeas. Rebecca Brown is working in Dr. Beth Prieve's Pediatric Audiology Lab. She is analyzing Bayley-3 data in babies born prematurely.

**Kelly Garcia** is currently working in Dr. Jonathan Preston's Speech Production Lab. Over the summer she completed a research project that focused on the relationship between phonological awareness and perceptual acuity in children with speech sound disorders, specifically, those who struggle with /r/.

Julia Gregoire is currently working in Dr. Victoria Tumanova's Stuttering Research Lab. She is studying Autonomic Nervous system arousal by looking at emotional reactivity to emotionally evocative images in preschool age children who do and do not stutter. The data will be used to determine if emotional reactivity plays a role in the onset of stuttering. She will present her work at the ASHA 2019 convention in November.

**Dannielle Hibshman** is conducting a research study in Dr. Ellyn Riley's Aphasia Lab. She is examining EEG vigilant attention levels in persons with aphasia during a linguistic and a non-linguistic task.

Angela Madrid is collaborating with Devon Pacheco on a project with the Psychology Department that looks at the brain's hemispheric differences in response to speech sounds and click stimuli in children with Autism Spectrum Disorder. Additionally, Angela is assisting Dr. Beth Prieve in writing an article about speech-evoked auditory brainstem responses in preterm infants.

**Monica Mascellino** is working with both Dr. Ellyn Riley and Dr. Victoria Tumanova on a project that measures EEG and skin conductance activity to determine the effects of stress on language.

Mariana Mendes Bahia is currently working in Dr. Soren Lowell's Voice and Swallowing Physiology Laboratory. Her initial research critically assessed the evidence base for the effortful swallow maneuver in a systematic review, which identified important current and future directions for her work. She plans to examine hyolaryngeal movement during the effortful swallow, and functional impacts of this maneuver in healthy individuals and ultimately in people with dysphagia.

**Kenny Morse** is currently working with his mentor, Dr. Kathy Vander Werff, on proposing his dissertation, which is focused on the discrete effects of noise exposure history and tinnitus. He plans to examine the interaction between noise exposure history and tinnitus on changes in auditory "gain" and the relative balance of excitatory, inhibitory, and spontaneous neural communication.

Chris Niemczak is working on his dissertation project with his mentor Dr. Kathy Vander Werff, which aims to examine the neural correlates of speech perception in noise, by systematically manipulating both linguistic similarity and auditory attention at both bottom-up and top-down levels of auditory processing. The goals of his study are to provide objective evidence of how both increased linguistic similarity and altered auditory attention increase the amount of speech perception difficulty experienced by the listener.

**Devon Pacheco** is currently testing school-aged children for a collaborative research project with the Center for Autism Research and the Electrophysiology Lab. The goal of the study is to investigate hemispheric differences in auditory processing to speech tokens and tonal sounds in children diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder.

Jasleen Singh is currently working on her dissertation project with her mentor, Dr. Karen Doherty. She is examining the use of over-the-counter (OTC) hearing aids by typical hearing aid consumers. She is interested in determining whether individuals will be able to; self-identify if they are a candidate for over-the-counter (OTC) hearing aids, self-select an OTC hearing device that fits their needs, and self-fit the OTC hearing aid they select.

## Clinical Highlights



### **Electronic Heath Records**

The Gebbie Clinic is preparing to transition to an electronic health record (EHR) during the fall semester. The EHR will allow us to securely share electronic information with clients, students, and clinical instructors, and promote efficient documentation and accurate, streamlined coding and billing while enhancing privacy and security of client data. Additionally, use of the EHR will help to prepare students for real world documentation experiences in their externships. Thanks to Joe Pellegrino and Kim Lamparelli for spearheading this effort.



## Multidisciplinary Evaluations for Preschool Children

Laura Vincent, our new Assistant
Teaching Professor, is conducting/supervising
the Committee for Preschool Special Education
(CPSE) evaluations for our program. Laura
previously worked as a speech-language
pathologist in a neighboring school district,
and served as a chairperson for the Committee
on Special Education. Jessie Buecheler, our
part-time school psychologist, serves as part
of our team for the psychological portion of
the CPSE evaluations. They look forward to
the opportunity to work with area school
districts to serve the youngest members of our
community as well as provide support and
resources to parents, caregivers, and families.



### Stroke Camp

Upstate University Hospital sponsored New York State's first Stroke Camp Sept. 6 to 8 at Greek Peak Mountain Resort in Cortland, NY. The mission of Retreat and Refresh Stroke Camp is to improve the quality of life for stroke survivors, caregivers, and their families and gives them a chance to experience patient recovery outside the hospital and to connect with their families. Camp activities were planned by the United Stroke Alliance, which partners with hospitals across the country to offer Stroke Camp. Stroke survivors and their caregivers enjoyed a weekend filled with outdoor activities, entertainment, educational sessions, games, and relaxation. More than a dozen volunteers, including Dr. Ellyn Riley and Ramani **Voleti**, were on site to support 10 survivors and 10 caregivers throughout the weekend.

### **Vestibular Donation**

A state of the art Videonystagmography (VNG) system has been purchased for the Gebbie Clinic through a generous donation from **Mr. George Knight** in memory of his late wife, **Kimberly Keller Knight**, who received her Master's in Audiology from SU in 1982. George graduated with an MS in Accounting from the Whitman School of Management in 1981. The new VNG system includes an air caloric irrigator, an LED projector and 60" wall mounted monitor for ocular motility testing, and a motorized exam table for positional testing.



This new system will allow for accurate diagnosis of vestibular pathology and will serve as a cutting-edge training tool for our AuD students.
